In nursery this week we have had some very EGG-citing visitors! We have been very lucky to be joined by some mystery eggs. The children have had some great ideas about what might have been inside such as, a turtle, a snake, a cow and a chick. On Wednesday the first egg cracked and we were very happy to see our first chick, shortly followed by chick number 2.









Reception

Reception had a virtual zoo visit from Chester zoo this week with a zoologist. The children learnt about the Humboldt penguin, finding out some fascinating facts about this animal for example; the penguin has white and black feathers to help them camouflage in the water and they are very good swimmers. The children devised their own questions to ask the zoologist during the session for example; Why can't penguins fly? What is a young penguin called?





The children also learnt about an Africian Elephant, finding out about their features, their habitat and the food they eat. We wrote some fascinating facts about the Africian Elephant during chid-initiated time for example; elephants are the largest animal on earth. The children are very excited to explore their new outdoor area next week in Reception.








Year 1

To start our new topic 'All about growing' we spent our Pens Down Day in the Forest School.

First, we found out about how trees are all different but they all have a trunk, roots, branches and leaves. We made our own trees using natural objects we found on the floor. We labelled the parts of the tree.







We then found out how some trees are evergreen, while some are deciduous. We walked around the school grounds to see if we could spot these types of trees.

After that we played forest school games such as 'you're only safe if...' and had marshmallows around the camp fire.







Year 2

In maths, we explored the idea of part and whole using concrete resources. This gave us the opportunity to focus on using our mathematical language. In literacy, we started our new topic: The Great Fire of London. We thought about how we could describe fire, and made some artwork based on this. In topic, we learnt that the Great Fire of London started on Pudding Lane and that the buildings were Tudor houses. We worked in teams to recreate Pudding Lane.



<u> Year 3</u>

For Pens Down Day, we were introduced to our new History topic about Ancient Egypt. We spent our Literacy lesson focussing on speaking and listening. We became archaeologists for the lesson and looked at pictures representing life in Ancient Egypt. We discussed what clues this gave us about daily life. We also discussed whether or not we would have liked to have lived in Ancient Egyptian times and why. For our reading session, we had fun reading different books off our History display bookshelf and we even had a special treat, looking at Ancient Egyptian artefacts and discussing what these could have been. This afternoon, we will be creating our own Egyptians pyramids and printing our names in hieroglyphics. Look out for photos of this in next week's newsletter!











<u>Year 4 – America Day</u>

For Pens down day, we were introduced to our new Geography topic of America. Firstly, we boarded our virtual flight to Chicago O'Hare airport. Freeze framing and thought tapping how we were feeling about our trip to the USA. Then in maths, we used the flight departure timetable to workout several questions with our partner. In the afternoon, we finally arrived at 'Chicago O'Hare airport' to embark on our own Route 66 adventure. Using the sights we saw and inspiration from a Johnny Cash song, we developed our own song and rap as a group.





















Year 5




Injustice sounds like people fighting crying for their rights.


Spotlight on Year 5!

Omegle & Discord - Social Networking Apps

Due to the increase in the usage of electronic devices and the internet over the pandemic, there has been a significant rise in young children falling victim to online harm. The Safeguarding Children Partnership (SCP) has in recent weeks become increasingly aware of young children accessing two social media sites in particular in which Children and Young People (particularly primary school age) have been traumatised through unintentionally viewing sexualised and abusive images of children and adults. These sites are called Omegle and Discord.



OMEGLE is advertised as 'a free online chat website that allows users to socialise with others without the need to register. The service randomly pairs users in one-on-one chat sessions.' The website also allows users to connect to webcams so they can be seen by the stranger they are talking to. It has an age rating of 18+ or 13 years + (with parental permissions).



DISCORD is an App that lets people chat via text, voice or video in real-time. It is very popular with gamers, and with the right privacy settings and monitoring it can be used safely. The safest way to use Discord is to only accept friend requests and participate in private servers with people you know. Avoid open chat functions. Discord has an age rating of 13 years +.

National survey of children launches today



The new Children's Commissioner for England, Dame Rachel de Souza, has today launched The Big Ask – the largest ever consultation with children aged 4 to 17 in England. It aims to find out children's concerns and aspirations about the future, so that we can put children at the heart of our country's recovery from the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak.

Parents, care leavers and those working with children are invited to complete the adult survey to share their views about the future for children and young people today, and what they think is holding young people back.

The results from this survey will help the Children's Commissioner identify the barriers preventing children from reaching their potential, put forward solutions and set ambitious goals for the country to achieve.
