Nursery

This week in nursery we have had great fun learning about and making scarecrows. We have made small ones in our workshop using different materials such as paper, straw and lollipop sticks and we have made a large one to keep the birds off nursery's vegetable patch. The children have also learned the action song Dingle Dangle Scarecrow.







Reception

Last week was Mental Health Awareness week and on Friday, we talked about how we could keep our brains healthy. We discussed how we could do this by resting, exercising, breathing etc. We spent some time in our forest school area making happy faces with natural objects.

National Numeracy Day was on Wednesday and in Reception we have been looking at how numbers

are an important part of everyday life. The children discussed where they would find numbers in the environment e.g. using money in the shop, road signs and house door numbers. We went on a walk around our local community to explore numbers and the children made a note of all the numerals that they could see.




Year 1

Year 1 have been baking cakes as part of National Numeracy Day. We thought about the different numbers that we needed to make cupcakes and then how we use numbers every day both at school and at home.



Year 2

Wednesday 19th May was National Numeracy Day. As part of this, Year 2 looked at how numbers are important in our daily lives. We looked at lots of different jobs and hobbies that use numbers and were surprised by how many there were! We watched a video from one of the National Numeracy Day ambassadors, Peter, who won the Great British Bake Off. We then had a go at following his recipe to make our own cupcakes. The recipe was for 12 cakes but we were working in groups of 6. We realised that we had to halve the quantities and so used our recent work on halving to do so. We also used fractions when thinking about how much vanilla extract to add!















Year 3

For National Numeracy Day, we discussed how we use maths in our everyday lives. We thought about hobbies and jobs that use maths, as well as everyday activities such as shopping or telling the time. Then, we followed a recipe to bake cupcakes. We measured out the ingredients and checked the scales carefully to ensure we had the correct amounts of each ingredient. Once we had finished our baking, we discussed how we had used maths.











Year 4

On Wednesday, Year 4 celebrated National Numeracy Day by looking at how numbers are used outside of school. First, we discussed where we would see numbers in jobs and hobbies and then we were virtually introduced to one of the National Numeracy Ambassadors, Katya Jones. We looked at dancing and explored the maths around some of the ballroom and Latin dances that are popular today. We even had a go at a dance ourselves.










Also this week, we had a visitor from Chemistry with Cabbage for an electricity workshop. We had a go with circuit boards creating simple circuits. After this we looked at a variable resistor, predicting whether the length or thickness of a wire would affect the brightness of a bulb. We consolidated our learning of conductors and insulators, we found out that graphite in our pencil was a poor conductor because the light bulb was dim when connected. Finally, we added a motor and buzzer looking at how connecting it would change the pitch of the sound or the direction of the motor.









Year 5

Year 5 celebrated National Numeracy Day this week, which had a theme of maths in the work place. We spent time researching charities and how they make money by organising fundraising events. We came up with some fantastic ideas like: selling delicious treats, running, cycling, selling books and clothes, even merchandise. The hard part was figuring out how we could run these events to keep our costs to a minimum to enable us to make maximum profit for our charity. Once we had finalised our ideas we then presented them to the class—much like they do in Dragon's Den.





Year 6



As part of our science unit, this week we created small games or artwork that utilised circuits. Most of the children decided to draw a clown and some even had its nose as a switch that would make a noise when it was pressed. Above are Kaitlin, Reuben, Leah and Kryszstof from 6B, who drew inspiration from the Cheshire Cat, using coloured lights to represent its eyes.

As part of National Numeracy Day, we discussed which jobs used numbers. We came to the conclusion that a lot of them did!

In their PE lesson on National Numeracy Day, Year 6 took part in timed sprint races. Children ran as fast as possible over a short distance whilst others timed using an ipad. Children were given the challenge of trying to beat their time. Children also took part in the long jump and measured each others distances.








Let's Count Day Competition
