Nursery garden update! This week we have been continuing our learning on understanding the world. We have observerd our beans growing in their bags and have started to plant them into pots. We have been watering our very big potato plants and have planted out some tomatoes and peas.

Science was lots of fun this week as we explored the best way to melt ice. The children were given blocks of ice containing small toys which they had to retrieve. They discovered that using warm water worked the best.















# Reception

This week we have had a very special visitor – Cheshire Fire Service! We were lucky enough to see all of the tools inside the fire truck that they use to do their jobs and learn about the different things they do each day. We learnt that not only do they put out fires, they save animals from trees and help out when people get stuck.







## Year 1

Year 1 have been learning about finding half and a quarter of shapes and amounts. In our problem solving lesson, they explored different ways that they could fill a square using halves and then using halves and quarters and recorded it by colouring their findings.









## Year 2

This week in year 2, we have been learning to use our mathematical vocabulary to describe turns. We used the words: quarter turn, half turn, clockwise and anticlockwise. In partners, we tried using this new language, as well as our directional language, by making our partner follow our set of instructions. We also had a go at turning objects.










#### Year 3

This week Year 3 started looking at poetry in literacy. The children explored different types of poems such as "Where Do All The Teachers Go?" and "On the Ning Nang Nong". The children then chose their favourite poem to perform in our very own Poetry Slam event. They thoroughly enjoyed reading all of the different poems and performed their chosen one incredibly well.









#### Year 4

We have been very lucky in year 4 to welcome visitors into our year group. Last Friday (6<sup>th</sup> May), we welcomed our Muslim community to celebrate Eid. They brought traditional dishes that they normally eat during Eid (breaking of the fast). All of year 4 would like to thank you for spending your time making such wonderful dishes for us to enjoy.









Then on Monday (9<sup>th</sup> May), we welcomed Ruth to school who completed an electricity workshop. We started the session looking over what we already knew. We had a go with circuit boards creating simple circuits. After this we looked at a variable resistor, predicting whether length or thickness of a wire would affect the brightness of a bulb. We were introduced to new vocabulary of conductors and insulators, we found out that graphite in our pencil was a poor conductor because the light bulb was dim when connected.








#### Year 5






# **Focus on Reception**




## Reading tips
