#### The Hubs

Inspired by the adventures of Emma Jane in the book Emma Jane's Aeroplane, Hub 3 children have explored the cities of London, Paris and Venice this week. They have looked at some of the famous landmarks in each city, and then had the opportunity to try foods and drinks that come from each place.

We have even more 'journeys' planned next week, so let's see where else the story takes us...













#### **Nursery**

This week in Nursery we visited the local co-op to purchase the ingredients to make an 'Iguana salad'. The children held hands with their partners and walked safely along the path. Whilst we were at the shop we discussed which foods are healthy and not healthy. The children were fantastic at finding the items on our shopping list!







#### **Reception**

This week, in our magic storybox session we met a turtle from the ocean who was feeling worried about all the pollution in his habitat. We talked about the types of pollution in the sea such as all the rubbish in the water particularly plastic, and the affects they have on the creatures living there. The children came up with some great ideas to help the turtle and all the sea creatures living in the ocean such as creating 'protect the ocean' posters, reducing our waste, recycling and using less plastic by using reusable shopping bags and water bottles.











This week in personal, social and emotional health lessons, we learnt about money; how it looks, what its value is and how it can be used e.g. to pay for things we need and for things we would like. We discussed how some things are more expensive than other things and how sometimes adults need to save their money so they can afford these things. We discussed this as a whole class and in groups of 3. Some of us shared our discussions with the rest of the class.









#### Year 2

After learning all about the leather buckets that were used to fight The Great Fire of London, we investigated which other materials could be used to make a bucket. We learnt the new words waterproof and absorbent before conducting a fair test to find out which materials were suitable for a bucket and why.











As part of our Literacy topic 'The Great Kapok Tree' this week, year 3 held a protest outside the Brazillian Government to try and encourage the ministers to put in more surveillence to deter the illegal logging of the rainforest.








Last week, we went on a local history walk. First of all, we headed to Stewart Street to look at some Victorian houses. We were able to spot lots of key features of these properties, such as detailed brickwork, decorative tiling, ornate gable trims, stained glass windows and bay windows. Our walk ended with a stroll around Queen's Park, where we saw the Clock Tower adorned with Queen Victoria's own face!























In literacy this week, we completed some drama activities! We closed our eyes and listened to a description of a mountain. We imagined ourselves in this setting and thought about our senses – what we could feel, see, smell and hear. We read the pictures of the mountains and created great descriptive phrases of what was inside the picture. Finally, we thought about the characteristics of mountains and created freeze frames to represent different parts. Magic microphone asked us what we might see, feel or say for the different parts of the mountain if it was alive. We were creating personification.







#### Year 6

In this week's science lesson, we had chaired discussions about the positives and negatives of solar farms. From that we had an opportunity to share with many peers our thoughts. Finally, we worked as a class to create a consensus circle which portrays the most relevant points of the positives of solar farms. We were articulate and thorough in our explanations. Ask us a question about solar farms – we're sure we can answer it.

Some of our Year 5 and 6 children have been working extremely hard to complete painting flowers which will form our new tribute to Acacia. Our 3D flowers were fading fast, so we have painted new flowers with acrylic paint that will withstand the weather. We have learned a lot about painting techniques in the process: stippling, blending and adding detail with fine brushes.
