In art, we pretended to be cranes and used our arms outstretched to lift and lower pom poms covered in paint, splatting them on to the paper in all kinds of patterns. It got messy very quickly!










Nursery

This week, in our magic storybox session we met Hector Gloop from the poo museum. When we opened our storybox there were a variety of jars. Throughout the week we explored the jars using our senses to find out which animal had left poo! By the end of the week we became 'Poo Experts' and sorted all of the different jars!









Reception

This week, we have been learning about the equator and hot desert animals in our Story Box sessions. We had a visit from Zoo2U were we got to see and touch different animals and found out how they adapt in their habitats.









Year 1

Year 1 had a very exciting day at Delamere Forest this week, and took part in lots of interesting activities. In the morning, they took part in an activity called 'Amazing Forests'. First, they played a game to find out what an oak tree needs to grow. Then they used the forest materials to make a tree and label it. After lunch, they worked as teams to make waterproof shelters out of things that they could find in the forest.











Year 2

Linking our topic with the Great Fire of Nantwich, Year 2 had a brilliant time on our trip to Nantwich Museum. We toured the town and saw Tudor houses. We learnt about what life was like for people in Tudor times and how they escaped the fire. Back at the museum, we dressed up and looked at lots of different artefacts and did some art work. We also re-enacted putting the fire out using leather buckets and found about a fire pump and how it was used.



Year 3

In maths this week, Year 3 have had lots of fun measuring the mass of different items around the classroom.











Year 4

This week, Year 4 took part in a debate about child labour. We compared our understanding of child labour in the Victorian Era (our current history topic) with how this still exists in other countries. Specifically, we looked at the textiles industry in Nepal. The children took on opposing and controversial roles, such as a factory owner, a teacher and a consumer, which lead to a great discussion. We were really impressed with how they incorporated lots of the strategies they have been learning through our oracy programme, Voice 21.












Year 5

In science, we have been looking after different forces. This week, we have been focusing on friction. We investigated our scientific question - does the surface affect the speed at which an object moves down a slope? We had a skier at the top of our slope and observed how long it took for the skier to travel down.

We know that the rougher the surface, the more friction and the slower it will move.



Year 6

In Literacy this week, we stepped into the story of Percy Jackson and The Lightning Thief and used a range of drama strategies to bring a key part of the text alive. We focused on the part of the text when the minotaur is chasing Percy, Mum and Grover. Firstly, we worked in threes and used the strategy 'Narrator, Action, Sound' to recreate the chase scene, which helped us when it came to writing triple action sentences. Next, we used the strategy 'Circle Packing' to consider how Mum would have been feeling during this part of the text. We packed up feelings of hope, desperation and faith.









Art News
